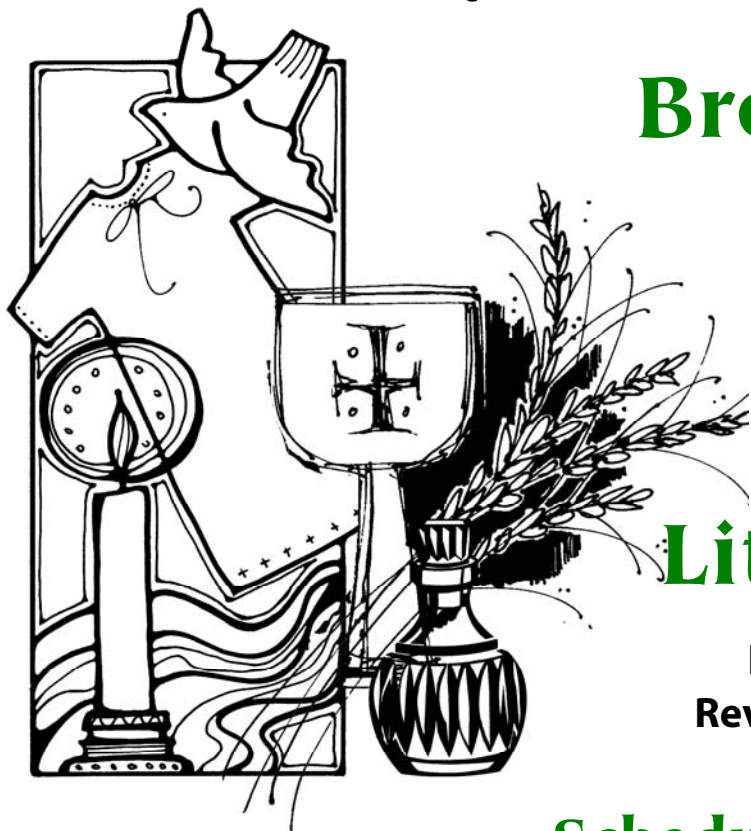

Keynote Presentation

Words have power, for they charm and repel, amuse and anger, reveal and conceal, chill and warm, clarify and obscure. Shortly, we will employ new words in our celebration of the Eucharist. As significant as these new words are, it is the doing of these words that will shape and make us, tell us who and whose we are. At this critical juncture in the Church's life we would do well not only to examine and embrace the new words, but plumb the power and passion of these words as they come alive in our encounter with the Triune God. In this keynote we will break open the liturgical world in which we shall pray poetically and scripturally. We will unearth the treasure of symbols and signs, silence and songs, gestures and postures, not only of the Eucharist but of all the prayer **of** the Church—Sacraments, Liturgy of the Hours, Blessings, and Eucharist. We will do so that in the continuing catechesis and on-going formation our people— young and old—we may all engage by the Holy Spirit's power that privileged means of experiencing the presence of Jesus Christ and participating in his work of redeeming the world all to God the Father's greater glory.

Reverend J-Glenn Murray, SJ is the former Director of the Office for Pastoral Liturgy in the Diocese of Cleveland from 1995 till 2007. Currently serving as Parochial Vicar at St. Aloysius Gonzaga Church in Washington, DC, Fr. Murray's gifts and talents have supported all manner of experiences, ranging from administrative through teaching to extensive pastoral activity.

Having received a Bachelor's Degree in Philosophy and Communications from Saint Louis University in 1970, a Master's Degree in Divinity with a concentration in Liturgy from the Jesuit School of Theology in Berkeley, California in 1983, he has since pursued

studies in Preaching at the Aquinas Institute in Saint Louis (1992-1993) and recently completed a Doctor of Ministry Degree with a concentration in Liturgy at the Catholic Theological Union of Chicago (May 2006).

He was an Associate Pastor at Holy Cross Church in Durham, NC while a campus minister at Duke University. He taught and was Vice-Principal at Saint Frances Academy, the oldest Black Catholic High School in the Western Hemisphere from 1981 to 1988.

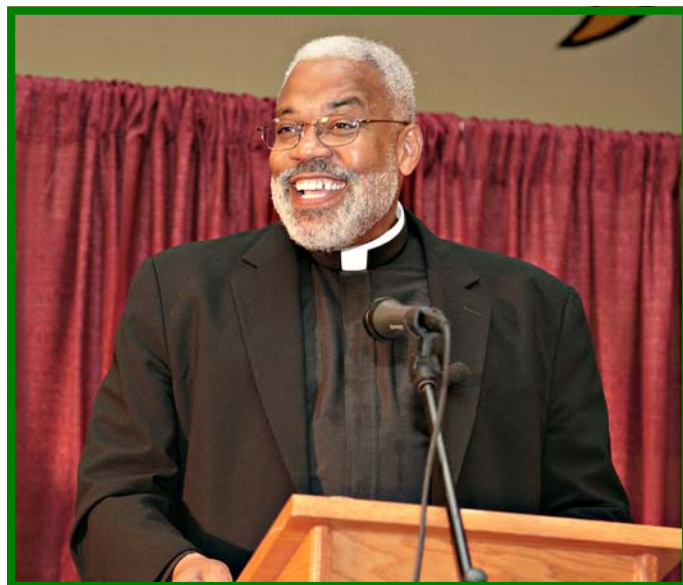
He was the principal drafter of the USCCB document, Plenty Good Room: The Spirit and Truth of African American Catholic Worship. Since that publication, the majority of his articles have appeared in the bi-monthly liturgical newsletter, Plenty Good Room, a former periodical of Liturgy Training Publications of Chicago.

From 1989 until June of 2007 he worked for the Diocese of Cleveland in the Office of Pastoral Liturgy, serving as its Director since 1995. He has taught at the Jesuit School of Theology in Berkeley as well as Saint Mary's Seminary and University in Cleveland, Ohio. He lectures widely in the areas of Liturgy and Culture, as well as conducting parish missions and priest retreats.

His memberships include the North American Academy of Liturgy, the Catholic Association of Liturgy and the newly constituted Jungmann Society, an international organization of Jesuits working in the liturgy and allied fields.

Teacher, composer, writer, campus minister, preacher, musician, Fr. Murray's focus has been instrumental in connecting faith with family; life with spirituality; and practice with service.

Among his many notable publications, Fr. Murray has shared his gifts for liturgy and preaching in The Spirit Sets Us Free: Confirmation Preparation for Youth and Embracing the Vision: Sacramental Catechesis for First Reconciliation and First Communion. In addition, Fr. Murray offered an invigorating catechesis in the video Why We Go to Mass: Liturgy and Our Lives by suggesting that we "hurl ourselves" into the mystery of the liturgy—fully, actively and consciously. Fr. Murray has a contagious passion for the Eucharist and the strength it gives to us as stewards in today's world.

Berinti is an adjunct faculty member for both the Institute for Ministry at Loyola University New Orleans and the Institute for Pastoral Ministry at St. Mary’s University, Winona, MN, as well as serves his religious community as Vice-Provincial of the Cincinnati Province. He currently serves as chair of the Special Interest Section for Pastoral Liturgy of the National Association of Pastoral Musicians and serves on the NPM Council. Working in the Church Without Losing Your Soul (or your Sense of Humor!)
